### Keywords and definitions:

You will need to be familiar with the following keywords in term 1.

Keyword	Definition	Use of keyword within context
Unit of consumption	One of the Marxist functions of family: Family buys and consumes a lot – plays a major role in generating profits. Media targets children who use ‘pester power’ to persuade parents to buy more. Children who do not have the latest things are often stigmatised and labelled by peers.	
Infant mortality rate	Measures the number of infants who die before their first birthday, per thousand babies born alive, per year.	
Globalisation	The idea that barriers between societies are disappearing and people are becoming increasingly interconnected across national boundaries.	
Death Rate	Number of deaths per thousand of the population per year.

Net Migration	The difference between the numbers of immigrants and the numbers of emigrants, this is expressed as a net increase or a net decrease due to migration.	
Conjugal Roles	The role played by husband and wife: these can be segregated (husband= breadwinner wife = homemaker, leisure time separated) or joint (husband and wife perform both roles, leisure time spent together).	
Social Policy	Refers to the plans and actions of state agencies, such as health and social services, the welfare benefits system and other public bodies.	
Postmodernism	A perspective that rejects the modernists' belief in progress and their view that we can have certain, true knowledge of society that will enable us to improve it. Society has become so unstable and diverse that it is now impossible to produce any absolute explanations.	
Ageing Population	Average age of the population is rising. With this comes benefits and risks of such a population i.e. issues with bed shortages in NHS	
Socialisation	How we learn the norms and values of society. This can be primary (through family) or secondary socialisation (media, education, religion etc).
