It was fantastic to be able to begin conducting field-work again after a forced break of 2 years due to the pandemic.



Blessed with great weather, the students investigated different economic, social and environmental changes to Stratford caused by the regeneration of the area. This kickstarts the return to fieldwork so watch this space for future fieldtrips.

Spelling bee at All Saints caused a big BUZZ

You may wonder where the spelling bee concept originates, it was in fact the United States which held the first spelling bee competition in 1925 and has since become popular in various countries around the world. It is an exciting and interactive approach to encourage students to broaden their vocabulary and improve their abilities, not only in English, but in other subjects across the board.

On Thursday 16th June 2022, All Saints School held its annual spelling bee. Eighteen eager students from Key Stage 3 and 4 took part in the competition, all ready to impress the judges! Our three judges were published author Mr Peter Inson, also a former teacher at All Saints school, Ms Rudhun our Head of English and Ms Whiley. With Year 8 as the audience, cheering on our spelling bee competitors, it was really an intense but very entertaining afternoon.

Rather impressively, the eighteen students, who competed in the final of the spelling bee, ranked amongst the top 3% of spellers in the school, who took part in order to win the title of the school's King or Queen Spelling Bee. Participants were subjected to four strenuous rounds including: spelling words correctly with definitions; completing words where definitions must also be correct and competing against other contestants.



In attendance at the All Saints Spelling Bee was former teacher and head of the English department, Mr Peter Inson who has written the award winning book 'Dunno'. Our Year 8 students and Spelling Bee competitors were lucky enough to hear some wise words from Mr Inson himself. He said 'By not reading regularly, you cut yourself off from writing, so it is best to read more.' The participants even got the chance to find out personal information about Inson – they went on to find out a fun fact which was that he initially failed his English exams, but with hard work and determination, went on to get a degree in English itself, demonstrating that anything is possible and that everyone should follow their dreams. After receiving such positive and inspiring advice from Inson, we hope he will come back to his roots soon and share some more of his wise wisdom with the budding authors amongst our school's population. After a tense and close competition, we have to say a massive congratulations to our KS4 Spelling Bee winner, William Odumosu and our KS3 winner Evie Howells. Both demonstrated great resilience as they had to spell so many words under the pressure and also give out their definitions which they did so effortlessly. We would also like to thank Ms Begum and Mr Ghani for frontlining the event. The All Saints Spelling Bee truly was a thrilling and enjoyable afternoon and truly a big thank you to all teachers in the English department for such initiatives at All Saints. Year 7 students have been introduced to aspect of Business through an Enterprise activity. Students have learnt business related topics such as customer needs, market research, aims and objectives in aid of creating a business plan. At the end of the term students will pitch their business ideas to the 'Dragons' for a chance to win an 'investment'. We are extremely proud of the effort

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and dedication our budding entrepreneurs have put into their final project.



A 'Level Business '

Our A 'Level students worked in groups to create a pitch for our international evening displays. The pitches needed to include: the purpose of the display, resources used and a prototype of the board. Students then pitched their ideas to the class and a vote was undertaken to choose the best ideas for the displays. Students then had to use their

leadership, organisation and communication skills to create the top two boards from the class vote. Throughout the process the quality

of the displays had to be managed and the outcome had to be compared to the original designs, implementing quality assurance knowledge which students had learnt earlier in the term. The business final boards explored two different concepts. One looked at key businesses from developing countries, comparing the population to how many people were employed by the business. The other looked at one business, and how that business uses the world and its economies to enhance what they do. Both boards were very informative and effective is outlining





the use of Business in differing countries.

This half term the Year 12 Business students have been learning topics about resource management and external influences. During one of their lessons, the students worked in groups to recreate three production methods for cupcakes. The students covered topics during the practical lesson including, 'production, productivity and efficiency'. The students decorated cupcakes using job, batch and flow production, while implementing quality management where they had to check the quality of their finished product against the success criteria. Legislation regarding food hygiene and health and safety

practices was also addressed. The students enjoyed the practical task and were able to make the links to the specification and discuss the topics at great length. The Business and Economics department would like to congratulate our GCSE and A Level student who have work extremely hard this academic year. What a busy year for our Eco -Ambassadors! It has been a very successful year. We have submitted our application to Eco-Schools England and now await the results! This year we focused on three targets: energy, biodiversity and school grounds. Energy has been our most successful target, with new solar panels possibly coming soon thanks to dedicated campaigns by the Eco-Ambassadors (Lucy, Maggie, Jessica and Lily).

In March, an envoy student represented All Saints at the first ever LBBD Youth Climate Summit in Jo Richardson School. Students networked and shared ideas with councillors and other schools. The Borough aims to be Green Capital of London by 2030.

Students have started work on St Francis Garden thanks to a £2,000 grant they received from <u>schoolfoodmatters.org.</u> Alongside this, they are continuing to create "grow zones" to enhance biodiversity. Dorel in year 10 produced amazing signs (Thanks DT for the help!) to protect these areas. Although the weather has been very unforgiving to our new plants. In the autumn we will install habitats around the school for birds and we will have live video feed coming from one of the bird boxes.

The Eco-Ambassadors have also been looking at ways to improve our school grounds for all. A new art installation in the year 8 playground (thanks to the Art Department) demonstrates our regrowth and revival after Covid-19 but also our new vision of a sustainable school environment in which nature is respected. Eco-Ambassadors have also designed a vertical garden made form plastic bottles. Our 6th form enrichment have also thoroughly enjoyed getting involved and we have therefore decided to have a dedicated gardening enrichment next year. 
Ms Hogan then took to the stage again, this time with Ms Gallant and represented Ireland performing an Irish dance which everyone enjoyed and clapped along.

Contemporary dance is on every Monday and Lower School Choir is on Wednesdays with Ms Hogan.



The gargoyle is a fantasy and horror monster inspired by the gargoyle architectural element. While they were believed in mythology to frighten away evil spirits, the idea of such statues physically coming to life is a more recent notion. Like golems, they are usually made of magically animated or transformed stone, but have animal or chimera traits and are often guardians of a place such as a cathedral or castle.







They ALL have an exaggerated expression.

These sculptures all started off as a simple pinch pot to which the features were attached using a technique called scoring and slipping.



The Art Department Year 7 3D Sculpture: Summer Term

The Year 7's this Summer Term have focused on 3D ceramic sculpture, based on gargoyles

Our Year 7 students were first asked to design a series of gargoyles that would have imaginary, unrealistic characteristics intended to frighten away evil spirits. using pencil and then fine point pen and markers.

Their drawing needed to include patterns to suggest for example; fur, hair, scales, feathers and horns .

Students selected 1 of these sketches to create a three-dimensional version of their gargoyle in clay.

Let have some fun with drawing....

Observational drawing is a great exercise in seeing.

When we look at something with the intent of drawing it, we tend to look more carefully than usual. We see, *truly see*, the shapes, the patterns, the perspective, the colours, the shadows, the contours, and how all of the details interact.

Continuous Line Drawing

The rule is that you must draw with one unbroken line, without taking your pen/pencil off the page.

Weak Hand Drawing

The rule is that you must draw with your weaker hand (the hand that you don't use for writing).





AllSains

Blind Drawing

The rule is that you must not look at the page – focus on the image and don't look at your drawing.

Holding multiple pencils

The rule is that you must hold two/three pencils at the same time and create a layered drawing


Parabolic Art is when maths and art collide! Creating beautiful patterns with straight lines. These are known as 'parabolic curves'.

The Year 9's made a fantastic start to their Art and Design studies in the Spring Term. The first part of the term they explored the theme of 'Pop Art'.

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
This provided the opportunity to explore Pop Artist' Roy Liechtenstein and Andy Warhol.




KS3 and KS4 Art and Design Students, were busy participating in this years 'Rivers of Hope' Project 2022!



Ultramarine

A blue pigment known as 'ultramarine' (meaning 'beyond the sea') became incredibly popular during the Italian Renaissance. Used widely in Europe from around the twelfth century, ultramarine is one of the most prevalent colours in western art history.

The deep blue pigment was made by grinding lapis lazuli into a powder.. Ultramarine was once so expensive it cost more than gold. It was commonly used by Italian artists in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries.












Caravaggio's Supper at Emmaus, on display at the National Gallery

Though countless eyes have marvelled at the mysterious drama unfolding in the shadowy interior of the inn in which the recently resurrected Christ has just revealed his true identity to a pair of dumbstruck disciples, the significance of an almost imperceptible imperfection has gone unnoticed in the four centuries since the painting was commissioned by the Italian nobleman Ciriaco Mattei in 1601.



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<u> Y8F - Everyday life</u>



<u>Y9T - French</u> <u>célébrations</u>



<u>A Level Chemistry</u>

Students in year 12 have worked diligently and observed reactions of halide ions and the disappearing 'X'. They have learned how to draw reaction mechanisms. They have also helped with the video for the school website. They have just

sat their mock exams and have shown true resilience with the pressures they have faced. Year 13 have worked so hard this year. They have learned how to accurately prepare an organic solid and how to use separating apparatus – all useful skills in pharmaceutical and analytical chemistry. Prior to paper 3 they sat a webinar that looked at the topics on Paper 3 of their exams. Their feedback was extremely positive and I wish them the best for the coming year.

A level Biology

It has been a busy term practical wise for Year 12. They learned how to use a colorimeter as part of one of their investigations into the effect of alcohol on pigment leakage from beetroot. Year 12 also showed brilliant aseptic techniques during their microbiology practical and their resulting plates showed some excellent clear zones and very little unwanted contamination – well done! They also got to revise using chrome books playing Booklet which made revision more interactive and certainly a lot more competitive! Year 13 showed great maturity in their run up to exams with some excellent essay writing skills evidenced.

A Level Physics

As we entered this term, we have been focusing on completing the course and having revision for previous topics. Practical's have been carried on successfully and skills have been transferred effectively.

Revision and reviewing topics has brought us to the actual mock exams prior to general AQA examination. Students have sat exams and I wish them all the luck for the coming results day.

We now have completed the AS topics, while we have been doing practical's and learning how to present information to peers and have had actual presentation on learnt topics. This half term have been intense in terms of expectations and assessments. That is a clear representation of the future expectations for year 13, as learners are building their independence. Flipped learning and homework underpins the current development in terms of achievements and progress. Individual targets being set and support being given accordingly. Intervention has been ongoing after school since the start of February, where further support could be given.

Year 10 and 11: Our little scientists are working hard in preparation for their GCSE exam. Booklet was being used to help them recall information.












Year 10 and 11 students carried out numerous outstanding experiments in all three sciences, including investigating the enzyme activity on starch at different temperatures. By doing this Students have applied their understanding of proteins and chemical bonds to account for the structure and properties of enzymes and demonstrating excellent skills that are required in real-world applications.









KS3 Science

It has been another exciting term in the Science department with all sorts going on with Science Club and in lessons.

Year 7 have been studying Inheritance and Human Reproduction and learning how many chromosomes are in egg and sperm cells and where DNA is found in cells. They learned the relative sizes of genes , DNA and chromosomes!

Year 8 have been continuing their knowledge of Waves from Year 7 and enhancing it be seeing how waves travel and transfer energy from one place to another. Here is 8B learning about transverse and longitudinal waves using a slinky with Mr Behan.





Year 9 have been learning about how substances are transported in plants and animals. Here they are carrying out a practical on osmosis in potatoes with Mr Manjra

We enjoyed welcoming our new Year 6 into Year 7 students into our school during the induction days last week. Pupils were able to study how acids and alkalis change colour in different indicators.







In Science club the year 7s have enjoyed a number of fun activities this term, with creating their own batteries being one and also learning about how different metal ions can produce amazing bright colours when placed in a Bunsen flame. Making your own fireworks is fun!



Higher Education Opportunities

UCAS/Apprenticeship research was to the forefront of PSHE this term. Students have been busy researching career options post year 13 whether through the Apprenticeship or University pathway. Students have attended webinars on how to write personal statements and how the UCAS application works. Pupils have also researched career paths through our careers platform UNIFROG. All pupils have access to this where they can research career opportunities of interest to them.

Pupils during the month of May participated in National University week where there were several opportunities for students to engage in live webinars regarding options after year 13. Along with several UCAS Discovery Days taking place in May and June for students to attend virtually.

Many students have and continue to apply for summer schools from various universities such as Cambridge, NHS, Sutton Trust, York University, PWC and Brokerage summer schools to name just a few.

Students this term have the opportunity to attend face to face open days with a group of students engaging in the Cambridge Hybrid Open Day Event which takes place over 2 weeks which involves a group of 30 students attending the face to face open day on the 8th July.

Work Experience taking place virtually this term for year 12 which also incorporates workshops on students finding their dream job, interview skills and how to build resilience in the workplace.
