There were guest speakers from various field of Biology including Gene Editing and Astrobiology along with a useful exam preparation session. It definitely gave the students food for thought about issues surrounding medical advances in genetics, Huntingdon's, feeding the human population in the future and potential career paths. Year 12 have been busy with practical's and playdough. Determining how much pigment leaked out of beetroot cells when placed in different temperatures was one of the required practical's that was carried along with

growing garlic root tips to determine how many cells were actively dividing when they carried out a root tip squash. The plasticine was used effectively to make a storyboard of the events of phagocytosis.

The Economic inefficiency of gift giving: Why you shouldn't buy presents for Christmas.

Joel Walfdogel an economist at the University of Pennsylvania has taken up the economic inefficiency of gift giving as a personal cause. By "inefficiency" he means the gap between the value to you (maybe very little) of the £120 argyle sweater your aunt gave you for your birthday, and the value of what you would have bought (some airpods say) had she given you the cash. In 1993 Waldfogel drew attention to the epidemic of squandered utility associated with holiday gift giving entitled "the deadweight loss of Christmas". "The bottom line is that when other people do our shopping, for clothes or music or whatever, it's unlikely they would choose as well as we would have chosen for ourselves. We can expect their choices no matter how well informed to miss the mark. Relative to how much satisfaction their expenditure could have given us, their choices destroy value. In summary buying gifts destroys value and can only in the unlikely best special case be as good as giving cash.

Modern Foreign Languages

"El plato del buen comer" was an activity worked with year 10 students since the theme for term 2 was "Healthy Living". It is a healthy eating guide that illustrates in **Spanish** the food groups that should be consumed to have a correct and balanced diet.

Once familiar with the Spanish vocabulary of food, we built sentences and paragraphs in Spanish using different tenses such as Present tense, Imperfect tense and near future.



"Targetas de estudio" was an activity worked with year 7 students since the theme for term 2 was "my family". They are cards that contain key concepts related to the verb "to have=tener" "to be=ser" and some adjectives that serve to describe themselves and some members of the family. On one side is the concept to be studied in Spanish and on the other, the concept in English.

Once familiar with the Spanish vocabulary of family, adjectives and the verb "tener and Ser" we build sentences and shorts paragraphs in Spanish using the Simple present tense.







"Targetas de Navidad" was an activity worked with students of year 7, 8 and 10, where apart from colouring, the young people wrote paragraph with wishes in Spanish exalting Christmas as a topic. We review family concepts, adjectives and the present tense simple.







"Arbol Familiar" was an activity worked with students of year 7,where each young person drew the members of the family and then wrote the concepts is Spanish. In general the children enjoyed doing this activity. Some young people shared their family tree with their peers.



"La Moda", was an activity worked with the 8 years where the young people had to investigated some fashions and then describe them saying what kind of clothes was, colours, prices and give opinions about if they it or not like it and why.



World Cup en español

Considering that the World Cup is currently happening, in our last Spanish lesson of the year, Y10 students did a few football activities in the target language. 1 of the activities was to create their ideal team referring to the different football positions in Spanish. They have been excellent in showing studious behaviour in lessons when practicing exam style questions. They have also been proactive in using the very useful resource, Uplearn.

The Moon came to All Saints

In September we had the pleasure to host the very precious BLUE BOX, generously lent to us by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI). This box contained fragments of meteorites and a lunar disc with samples from the moon itself. All students in our Year 7 and Year 8 participated in 50-minute sessions run by the science department with activities aimed at kindling young minds' curiosity towards science. This very specific learning topic of the moon and more generally space, perfectly relates to the scheme of work in Key Stage 3 'Earth and its structure'.

Each class of 30 students was initially split into pairs and asked to classify normal items into groups, based solely on their appearance. This was a pivotal point to introduce the idea of 'classification' in science. Students were then put into groups of six and asked to actively investigate and inspect a number of meteorite fragments, trying to identify their names based on their physical properties (colour, weight, magnetism). This proved a very successful activity as the feed-

back was overwhelmingly positive with students and staff that accompanied their classes to the sessions. Each student received a laminated certificate so they can proudly boast as 'moon rocks handlers'.

Colin Stuart Author came to visit during our space themed week. He gave an inspiring talk to Year 7 students about how space exploration has changed over time and how Mars space exploration in particular is having success, plus what it takes to be an astronaut.
