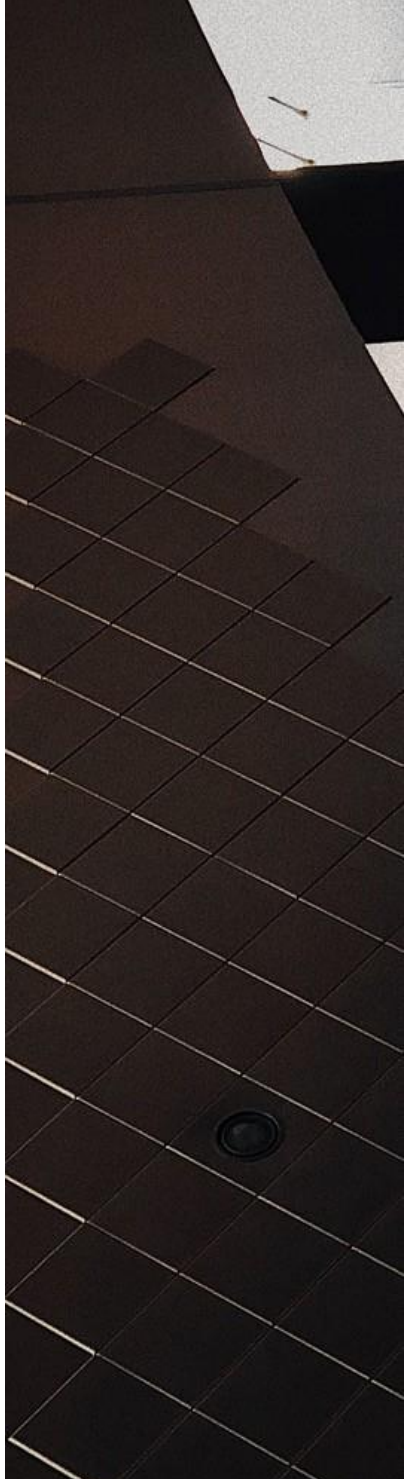

Healthy Relationship Project

Since September 2019 All Saints Catholic School has been working alongside Ashiana Network and Tender Education and the Arts to deliver a project aimed at raising awareness about healthy and unhealthy relationships and VAWG (Violence against Women and Girls).

The project adopted a whole school approach, with assemblies taking place for years 7-11, a two day drama workshop project with Year 8 and a Year 9 group programme, covering topics such as: types of abuse, coercive control, stats about domestic violence, cyber safety and information about support available.

Young people are statistically the most likely to experience domestic violence, with women and girls (and some men and boys too) experiencing abuse that can affect them physically and psychologically, often with devastating consequences. In this age of technology, young people can also be extremely vulnerable, even in their own homes, with issues of cyber bullying, on-line harassment and grooming an ever-present threat.

Many young people confide in their friends and peers if they have a worry or a problem, so the project aimed to not only help young people to recognise the early warning signs of unhealthy relationships and abuse for themselves, but to also empower them to know how to support others who might be experiencing it.

If you, or anyone you know has been affected by domestic violence or any type of abuse help is available. Ashiana Network is a charity supporting women and girls who have experienced, or are at risk of gender based violence (domestic violence, forced marriage and so called 'honour' based violence, for example). Identifying need

- All Staff are trained in how to identify and escalate concerns through the safeguarding referral systems

Method	Communication	Action following referral
Bullying Survey Every Half term	Online or paper copies in form. Can be accessed any time by pupils. Notifications sent through to DSL	All incidents addressed through Head of year and escalation to the DSL
CEOP referrals	High levels of communication about where to go with online referrals.	CEOP have contacted when referrals are received from students
Toot Toot Wellbeing survey	Referral system on line – communicated through PSHE and online links	Being introduced – wellbeing can be addressed with specific interventions.
Direct referral to NSPCC	NSPCC – in student safety booklet each term sent to them	Support through NSPCC
Edukit profiling	Identification wellbeing need linked to 12 criteria from school life to relationships at home and in school	Support programmes for high level of need, analysis and identification of vulnerable children
